Credit Transfer Agreement:

**University Of Wisconsin Oshkosh
College Of Education and Human Services
Bachelor of Science Degree in Human Services
and
Blackhawk Technical College
Associate Degree:
Criminal Justice – Law Enforcement**

Introduction and Rationale:

The University of Wisconsin Oshkosh maintains an educational partnership with Blackhawk Technical College to provide opportunities for students to enter bachelor's degree completion programs. This Agreement specifies the transfer of credit from the Associate Degree named above to the Bachelor of Science Degree in Human Services at UW Oshkosh, in recognition that this program prepares students for admission to this bachelor's degree program. The underlying assumption for this Agreement is that the technical college provides a foundation of occupational courses and the University provides the upper-level courses required within the Human Services program.

Conditions:

The terms of transfer of this program-to-program agreement apply only for the purposes of entry to the Bachelor of Science degree in Human Services program at UW Oshkosh. BTC students seeking admission to other degree programs offered at UW Oshkosh may transfer to the University only those credits recognized under the current UW System – WTCS Transfer Guidelines as documented on the Transfer Information System web site at: <http://www.uwsa.edu/tis/>. BTC students admitted to UW Oshkosh under the terms of this agreement who subsequently elect to pursue a degree and major other than the Bachelor of Science degree in Human Services will find the extended transfer of credit does not apply outside of this program.

Students from BTC must have completed the above-named Associate degree program with a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.75/4.0 for consideration for transfer under the terms of this document. The terms of the agreement do **not** apply to BTC students who have completed only a portion of the required course work for the Associate degree named above.

Transfer of Credit:

- UW Oshkosh accepts in transfer the Associate Degree major courses as block credit without designation of course-by-course equivalencies (see attached).
- Additional course work completed in the area of general education will be accepted in transfer on a course-by-course equivalency basis as detailed in the Transfer Information System (TIS).

- This agreement abides by UW System policy to transfer a maximum of 72 credits earned at two-year institutions to University of Wisconsin baccalaureate degree programs.

Effective Date :

This agreement is effective October 1, 2007.
